2026 HARBOR NOTES

In July 2025, Brandon Calhoun officially became the new Harbormaster for the City & Borough of Sitka. Previously, Calhoun served as the Harbor Maintenance Supervisor. Sitka welcomes Mike Martello as the new Harbor Maintenance Supervisor.

For the 30-year-old Eliason Harbor (built in 1996, with a second phase in 1998), Sitka received grant funding from the State of Alaska. The 2025 state harbor matching grant is dedicated to the \$1.1 million project, specifically to “general electrical maintenance and float repair, the goal being to extend the life of the harbor,” acknowledges Calhoun. Richard I. Eliason Sr. Harbor is the furthest north of Sitka’s harbors.

The Sealing Cove fish-cleaning floats were replaced in 2025.

Regarding the all-important Fishermen’s Work Float, repairs are being completed during March and should be done by early April. “It was a re-hab project,” says Calhoun, “so it was a major structural repair.”

In the cruise ship outlook, there are 69 ships expected to be lightering to CBS facilities in 2026, with the first being about April 26th and the last about September 30th.

The Harbor Website is “something we in the Harbor Dept. always do our best to keep up-to-date and this is done in-house.” CBS urges mariners to visit cityofsitka.com/departments/Harbors.

The GPIIP (Gary Paxton Industrial Park) hosts the smaller cruise ships, and that schedule is on the website. The Harbor Department now has a Reservation Calendar that is available for the public to view at sitkadockspace.org.

New fees for Moorage and Transient Vessels go into effect on July 1st, 2026.

Calhoun says that the State of Alaska is rumored to be discontinuing the state matching grant, at least for 2026.

In conclusion, he says, “The Sitka Harbor Department will focus on providing the services our users need, and finding a sustainable, creative way to maintain our infrastructure.”

LEE HANSON

A Vocation in Maritime Salvage

Vocation: from the Latin “vocare” - “to call” - “a strong feeling of suitability for a particular career; a person’s main occupation, regarded as particularly worthy and requiring great dedication; a trade or profession. ~ Oxford Languages

1993. That was the year that Lee Hanson, fresh out of Sitka High School, raised his first boats at Crescent Harbor and Thomsen Harbor.

While these were relatively straightforward operations, since the boats actually went down “in harbor” this was still a significant landmark - or watermark - for young Hanson.

But the first whispers of what would become his obsession with marine salvage actually began even earlier, in 1984, when the self-described “local boy” became a Certified Scuba Diver.

“I was first certified in Sitka by Bob Boes at Southeast Diving & Sports. I was nine years old. At the time there wasn’t a minimum age, but after my certification, the certifying agency made 12 the minimum age.” Trained as a marine

biologist and experienced as a diver, Boes owned and operated that tiny Sitka storefront in the 1980s.

Hanson went on to get Advanced and Rescue Diver certifications through the same agency, but wanted to work as a commercial diver legally. In 1997 he obtained his Commercial Diver Certification from the Association Of Diving Contractors.

Hanson notes with a twinkle that he even made childhood money by regularly diving and cleaning the bottom of boats.

UNFATHOMABLE FASCINATION WITH TUGS

“I used to watch tugboats going to and from the pulp mill (the Alaska Pulp Corporation, or APC mill, which operated in Sawmill Cove from 1959-1993). I always wanted to work on the tugs.”

But back then, notes Hanson, even to be a deckhand, you had to have what was

called a Z-card or a merchant mariner document. You had to have a sponsor, a job and a company to write you a letter. They'd write to the Coast Guard, saying, "We intend to hire this person if you issue him this document."

"You'd go to Juneau, they'd fingerprint you, you'd be processed and then get your Z-card - a big card, larger than a driver's license. That was your seaman's papers, so you could work on tugs and larger boats."

Hanson had actually worked on a tug, kind of under the table, doing ship assists at the pulp mill in '91 or '92, before it closed. Then, when he turned 18, George Baggen of Samson Tug and Barge had helpfully written the letter for the young man to get his seaman's papers.

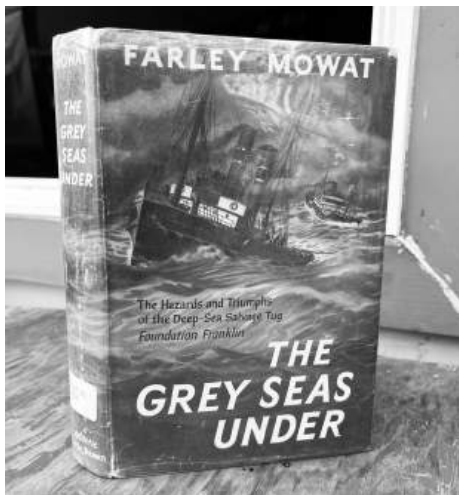
"So, then I could legally crew on a tugboat and also be diving at the same time." Hanson did go on to work for Samson and other west coast companies, eventually earning his master of towing vessels.

But Hanson's "Ah-ha Moment" - the moment when he realized he might actually have a vocation in maritime salvage - came when he read Farley Mowett's *The Grey Seas Under*. Written by the Canadian author and environmentalist (who later wrote *Never Cry Wolf*) and published in 1958, the non-fiction Grey Seas tells about the Atlantic salvage tug *Foundation Franklin*, which operated in Canada's maritime provinces from 1930-1948. It's been identified as one of the few nonfiction books to detail the adventures of a salvage tug and its crews.

Hanson marvels at how the novel miraculously seemed to combine and align all his interests in diving, tugboats, and maritime law - thus, making maritime salvage an attractive career. He shakes his head, visualizing his own collection of books, including many copies of Mowat's life-changing book.

Working at Samson, he was definitely exposed to the necessary trades. He learned how to operate a crane, load containers and things like that.

As an early teen, he had taken welding courses at UAS. So, the young Hanson had heavy equipment operation, welding, and a working knowledge of maritime law. At 18 or 19, he would often go to the Sitka Courthouse and visit the law library to learn more. And then, there was the diving.

"Finally after reading the book, I realized that all of those things were what you needed to work in salvage. I began to feel like it was what I was meant to do."

WHY MARITIME SALVAGE?

There are many reasons for such a field to exist, says Hanson, including practical, environmental and legal reasons. Sometimes, the legal and environmental reasons may overlap, and sometimes the law is necessary to ensure ethical actions.

Hanson shrugs, "Some people might just do whatever they want if the law wasn't there. They might just say, you know, morally and ethically, you need to deal with it. But that doesn't mean it'll happen. Sometimes you need the law there to make it happen."

There are folks, Hanson recognizes, who may take years and maybe even never find something that seems like a good fit for them, while he just kind of

steadily and miraculously gravitated into this good fit. "Yeah, what I was meant to do, you know, and it comes easy to me."

Hanson's legal title is "Salvage Master." The Salvage Master is the person who has the ultimate authority for the success or failure of the job, who is in charge and has qualified as a master mariner - proficient at all the relevant trades. He maintains he would never be happy just being a diver or a tugboat captain or just an equipment operator.

"I really enjoy them when they're all part of a larger process. Kind of like a Swiss Army knife."

THE HISTORY OF SALVAGE & ADMIRALTY LAW

Hanson is also knowledgeable about the history of salvage and what's known as maritime or admiralty law. He points out that Lloyd's of London was pivotal in the early stages of intermixing maritime law and the business-side of things.

The earliest references were from 1688, when the Lloyd's Coffee House was a popular place for sailors, merchants, and ship-owners, and Lloyd catered to them with reliable shipping news. The coffee house soon became recognised as an ideal place for obtaining marine insurance.

"These companies, these underwriters," Hanson explains, "were essentially bidding on it. They were like, well, what ship is it? Is it in good condition? Am I familiar with it? And who's the captain? Is he a good captain? What's the likelihood of success or failure? It was

very hands-on and raw. If a ship ran aground, you could render assistance and refloat them and you would get an award, the amount determined through arbitration. So there was an incentive to save ship and cargo.”

Hanson continues, “The first ‘salvors’ were amateurs. They were just ‘vessels of opportunity’ that happened to be nearby. It was the underwriters who created a system of reward and incentive.” The maritime insurance or underwriting system continued to develop, and become more organized in the 17th through the 19th centuries.

MODERN SALVAGE OPERATIONS

In considering 20th century developments that impacted the business of marine salvage, Hanson

stresses, “The Exxon Valdez changed *everything*.” The Exxon Valdez Oil Spill was a major environmental disaster that occurred on March 24, 1989.

The following year came the Oil Pollution Act of 1990, which created a comprehensive prevention, response, liability, and compensation regime to deal with vessel- and facility-caused oil pollution to U.S. navigable waters.

Hanson Maritime began operations in 1993 as Underwater Services, specializing in commercial diving and salvage. In 2000, towing was added and the name was changed to Hanson Maritime Co.

Hanson says hundreds of tows have been made and nearly 200 vessels have been salvaged during his career.

Hanson's hallmark statement is, "We practice an almost forgotten method of salvage, where we respond immediately to vessels in peril, often resulting in rescue rather than salvage, and always using our best endeavors to minimize

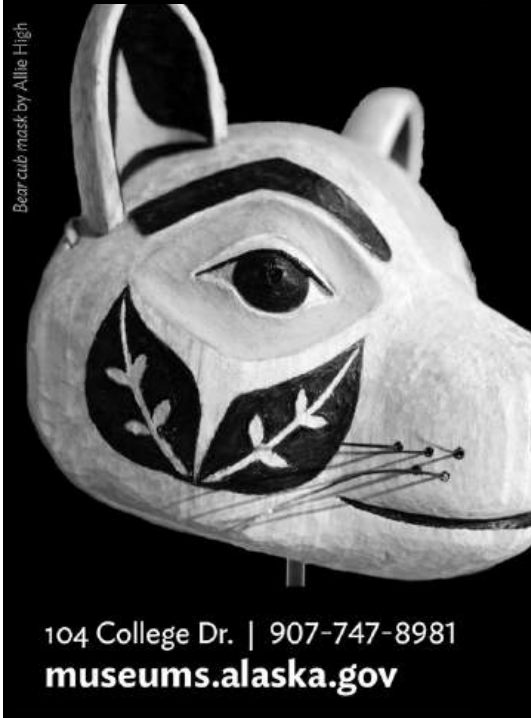
further damage, protect the environment, and preserve vessel and cargo value."

He recalls, "I can think of one seiner that sank, and had we not raised it and de-fueled it, etc., that fishing area would have been closed for the season."

In these complex days, Hanson says he cannot overstate the importance of submitting a salvage plan and coordinating with multiple entities to ensure successful operations. "You cannot leave a boat in state waters. And when the Coast Guard hires us, we have to be able to respond within four hours."

TECHNOLOGICAL ADVANCEMENTS

The impact of technological advancements is also profound in

today's world of maritime salvage. Smartphones and Starlink, for example, have been key to improving response times and efficiency. Hanson notes the modern benefits of real-time communication and the ability to send photos and videos for rapid decision-making.

He is also very careful to explain that the salvage business involves various professional terms, such as salvage and wreck-removal. In cases where the vessel is a total loss, it is important that wreck-removal is done according to state law. Then, there is the matter of disposing of raised boats, including sorting metal and wood for recycling.

Hanson is also quick to discuss the importance of community involvement and the role of local businesses in

salvage operations in Southeast Alaska. He recounts his company's personal connection to the F/V *Eyak*, which he helped salvage, and his ongoing work with the owner, David Castle.

The first of two articles about the *Eyak*, written by Will Swagel, appeared in the 2014 *Sitka Harbor Guide*. Then, on January 19, 2015, the *Eyak*, “an integral part of the Sitka Waterfront, tore a chunk out of her middle on a rock near Goddard Hot Springs and sank.” Swagel’s second article “*Eyak’s Back*” appeared in the 2016 *Sitka Harbor Guide* after the boat was resurrected.

Nowadays, Hanson and his crew travel throughout Southeast Alaska as projects demand. In March, they raised a vessel in Juneau, then brought it back to Sitka where it was demolished and recycled.

Hanson says, “I’ve never had any young person approach me about working in salvage and that makes me sad. I wish that more young people were interested in the pride and tradition of being mariners.”

When all is said and done, there’s a vast, skilled professional network that supports the fishing fleets.

RAFE HANSON: RUBBER BAND CAMERA

An Artist Profile

Rafe Hanson was born and raised in Sitka. He attended a private Seventh-day Adventist school before earning his GED. His father is Salvage Master Lee Hanson. “I have grown up my entire life in that industry. I’ve worked on my dad’s current tugboat, and he taught me commercial diving.”

That background is closely tied to the subjects he photographs. His work focuses largely on landscapes and seascapes, along with documenting commercial fishing. Hanson has photographed throughout Southeast Alaska, including Baranof Island and Chichagof Island - places he describes simply as “the gorgeous tract of public lands we get to call our backyard.”

Hanson’s entry into photography began early. When he was about 12 or 13, he found an old digital Minolta camera at the White Elephant for three dollars.

“I had to keep the battery compartment closed with rubber bands,” he says. “I loved that camera. It had an excellent zoom and was great for taking pictures of wildlife.”

Since then, he has owned roughly seven cameras, working primarily with Nikon digital single-lens reflex cameras after that first Minolta. He once entered the Harry Race Photo Contest and won in the landscape category, along with an honorable mention in another category. With money earned commercial fishing with his dad, he has been able to update his cameras over time.

Today, Hanson’s day job is with the City and Borough of Sitka electrical department at the Blue Lake hydro plant. “It is shift work. Somebody has to be there 24 hours a day,” he says.

In 2022, Hanson started High Ridge Expeditions, a business that combines guided fly fishing, charter fishing, whale watching, and water taxi service - bringing people anywhere they need to go, including forest service cabins, hot springs, and communities such as Pelican. “I am a very outdoorsy person and wanted to bring that to others,” he says.

Photography has long been integrated into his work and daily life. When he was younger, he describes it as “pretty seamless,” especially while working on the tugboat and documenting fishing.

Hanson notes that his favorite style of photography is street photography, often carrying a camera while hunting or fishing. In the last three years, since having children of his own, balancing photography with family life has become more of a challenge.

Growing up in Sitka continues to influence his work. “Nature, beauty, it’s all around you,” he says. “There’s always beauty to be had in Sitka. I don’t think you can take a bad picture here. I really like being the person to give that to people.”

Hanson has photographed both the natural landscape and the people who work within it. On his Instagram, he shares underwater photography and videos of sea life, including a giant rock scallop, as well as images of fishermen such as Dave Richey in the wheelhouse of his boat, the F/V *Albee Rose*. He also captures Sitka street scenes, including a photograph of downtown Sitka just after sunset in April 2025, featuring Ernie’s Old Time Saloon.

Hanson is a published photographer, with work appearing in *Pacific Fishing Magazine* and *National Fisherman*. His photograph of his father in diving gear appears on the front cover of the 2026 *Sitka Harbor Guide*.

He does not typically title his photographs, noting that he might if he were to print them. For now, most of his work is shared online - on his website at rafehansonphoto.squarespace.com, on Facebook [@rafehansonphotography](https://www.facebook.com/rafehansonphotography) and on Instagram [@rafe_hanson_photo](https://www.instagram.com/rafe_hanson_photo), which is his most active platform. He can also be reached directly at rafehansonphotography@gmail.com.

“Oddly enough,” he says, “a lot of people know my name but nobody knows what I look like.”

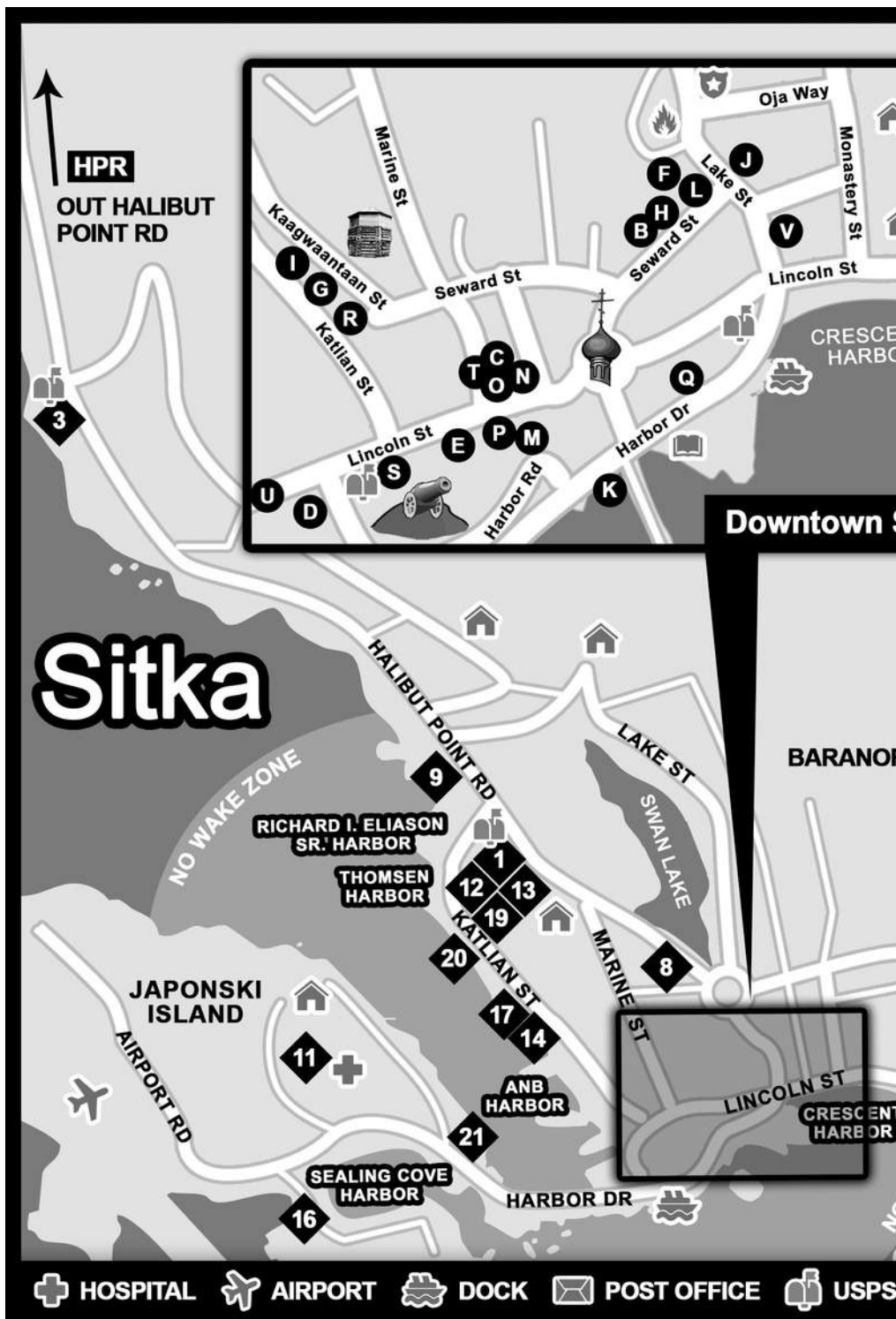

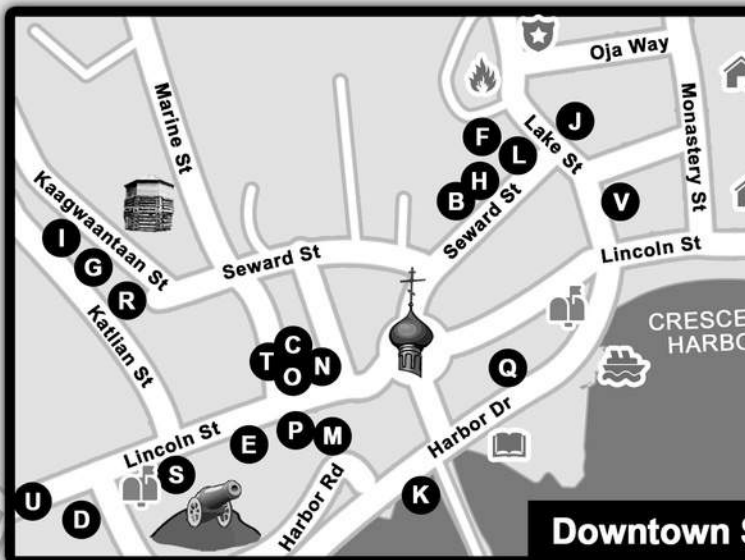

ALASKA NATIVE BROTHERHOOD & ALASKA NATIVE SISTERHOOD: THEN & NOW

A Timeline with Selected Highlights

"The Alaska Native Brotherhood (ANB) was founded in 1912 at a meeting held in the office of W. G. Beatty, General Superintendent of the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Alaska. This meeting was a landmark in the history of American Natives, the aboriginal inhabitants of North America. Twelve Southeast Alaska men and one woman are known as the organizers and founders of ANB. They acted in response to the growing sense of frustration felt by the Natives of Alaska" [1].

1912

ANB was founded in Sitka, Alaska

1914

ANB Founders Hall (Camp No. 1) was built on the Sitka waterfront

1915

Alaska Native Sisterhood (ANS) was formed by a group of women in Wrangell, Alaska

1913-1917

Annual Grand Camp was held in Juneau, Sitka, Metlakatla, Wrangell and Juneau, respectively

1918

No Grand Camp Convention was held due to the influenza epidemic

1919 & 1928

Grand Camp was held in Sitka

1920s-1940s

ANB and ANS held increasing political power

"The ANB was active in the pursuit of voting rights and citizenship for Alaska Natives. In 1922, ANB leader and attorney William Paul successfully defended his great-uncle Chief Shakes against the felony charge of voting illegally. Thus, Alaska Natives won the right to vote two years before Congress passed the Indian Citizenship Act in 1924" [2].

1927

Grand Camp was held in Angoon

"The ANB voted to allow the ANS full voting privileges during this historic convention" [3].

1928

No Grand Camp Convention was held due to the depression

1929

Grand Camp was held in Haines

"The struggle of the Tlingit and Haida people to bring about a just settlement for lost lands and rights began at the ANB Annual Convention of 1929 in Haines. William L. Paul, Sr., ANB Grand Camp President, chose to present to the delegates the issue of pursuing the legal claims of the Tlingit and Haida Indians against the U.S. government. Paul, a Tlingit from Wrangell, was the first Native to practice law in Alaska. He returned from law school in 1918 and, with the encouragement of his brother Louis, joined the ANB. Founding father Peter Simpson had a strong influence on Paul. It was Simpson who first suggested the idea of pursuing the claims. Paul recalled the moment years later. In 1925, Simpson whispered, 'William, the land is yours, why don't you fight for it.' The 1929 convention unanimously adopted a resolution requesting Congress to investigate the claims of the Tlingit and Haida people. One section of the resolution succinctly stated the case, 'Whereas the U.S. government has locked up the forest so that what was formerly ours must now be purchased from a government that gave us nothing for it'" [4].

1945

The Anti-Discrimination Act of 1945 was passed, after persistent lobbying by Elizabeth and Roy Peratrovich

"The brotherhood led a series of boycotts against businesses that discriminated against Indigenous peoples of Alaska and in 1945, lobbied successfully for the passage of the Antidiscrimination Act by the territorial legislature. It also successfully lobbied Congress to extend the 1934 Indian Reorganization Act to include Alaska. This contributed to economic development in southeastern Alaska by enabling several Alaska Native villages to apply for federal loans to purchase fishing boats and canneries" [2].

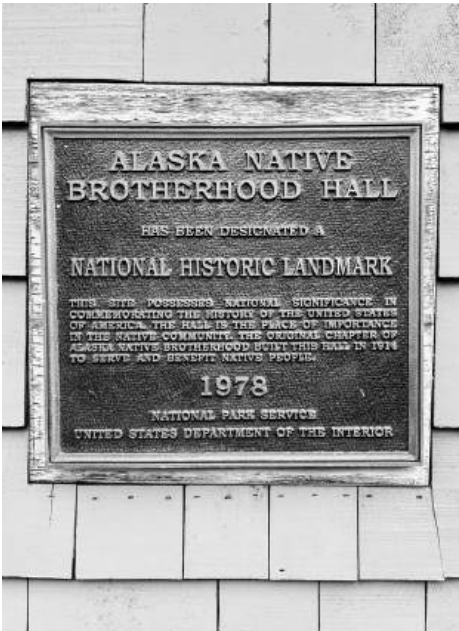

The Harbor Department of the City and Borough of Sitka enforces Harbor Regulations in all five city harbors and other city facilities.

HARBOR RULES & REGULATIONS

No Wake Zone: No speeding is allowed in the channel. Please respect the No Wake Zone shown on the map (pg 20-21).

Temporary Stalls: The Harbor Department may assign a vessel a stall on a temporary basis, depending on availability. This is called "hot berthing." Owners of vessels granted temporary assignment must be ready to move if requested by the Harbor Department.

Fees: Moorage fees will be assessed by the Harbor Department, based on the rate structure in the City municipal code. Moorage bills must be paid at the Harbor Office.

Registration of Transient Vessels: All transient vessels are required to register with the Harbormaster within 12 hours of

arrival. Information on services and fees is available at the harbor office.

Moorage of Transient Vessels: Transient vessels are advised by Harbor Department staff of the transient moorage areas available on a first-come, first-served basis.

Transient Fees: Transient moorage fees are \$1.56 per foot per day for vessels 0-80 feet in length. For vessels 81-150 feet, \$2.66 per foot per day. For vessels more than 150 feet, \$3.98 per foot per day. All moorage must be paid in advance or prior to departure or fees may be doubled. Harbor policy requires that if a vessel is in the harbor on any portion of any day, it will be charged for moorage for that day. A 25 percent credit in daily transient moorage will be given to any commercial vessel actively loading or unloading fish and

which produces a fish ticket or contract from a Sitka processor. The credit will be good for up to 10 days per fish ticket or contract.

Transient Services: Water, garbage and waste oil service are available.

Launch Ramp Fees: The daily fee is \$5.00 for in and \$5.00 for out. The annual calendar year permit is \$75.00 and is available at the harbor office. Launch ramps are located at Sealing Cove and Crescent Harbor.

Monthly (30 day) Moorage Permits: Thirty (30) day moorage permits are available, paid in advance. The cost is \$26.68 per foot for vessels up to 150 feet in length, and \$40.00 per foot for vessels above 150 feet in length.

Small Boat Electrical Service: 30 amp single phase service may be available for a

fee of \$7.00 per day. 50 amp single phase service may be available for \$15.00 per day up to 4 days. If staying 5 days or longer the meter can be read, which includes a \$10.00 in and \$10.00 out fee plus actual meter usage. Meter reads will be done for 50 amp 3 phase and 100 amp meters.

Temporary Use of Assigned Meter: The Harbormaster may temporarily allow a transient vessel to plug into an assigned meter. The assigned meter holder's account receives credit. A note: Utilizing assigned meters is a privilege and the Harbormaster frowns on meter use without permission. Violators will be issued citations for illegal use of a meter.

Garbage: Dumpsters are available at all harbors for use by harbor patrons. Items too large for the dumpsters are to be taken to Jarvis Street Transfer Station. Items should not be left on the floats or fingers of any of the harbors.

These should be taken to the Sawmill Cove Industrial Park scrap yard, where a special materials collection area is maintained. When dumping used oil, please clean debris and old filters off the screen when you are finished.

Water: Potable water is provided at all harbors year-round.

Dumping Trash Into the Harbors

Prohibited: It is unlawful to do or cause to be done any of the following prohibited acts: No offal garbage or trash shall be dumped into the boat harbor. No trash, garbage or refuse shall be dumped on the tidal or upland areas along the beach or waterfront. It is unlawful to dump flammable wastes. Vessel owners shall not leave spoiled bait, fish or gear on their vessels in the harbor.

Fishermen's Work Floats: There are two work floats available. One is the seasonal float located at the end of Float 4 at Crescent Harbor. This float is available for work-related uses April 15-Sept. 15 annually. A year-round work float is located on Sitka Channel across from ANB Harbor. This float is equipped with both electricity and potable water. No overnight moorage without permission of the Harbormaster. No storage of any gear, nets or materials is permitted. All users of these floats are asked to clean up after themselves. *Fees: No charge for the first 24 hours. Vessels 50 feet in length and under \$.80 per foot, per day. Vessels 51 feet in length and above \$1.00 per foot, per day. These charges are in addition to the permanent tenant quarterly moorage rates, or daily transient fees.*

Tidal Grid: A steel and timber tidal grid is available for use next to ANB Harbor. Electricity, potable water and garbage services are available. A small parking lot is

located next to the grid for people using the facility. The grid is available on a first-come, first-served basis. Vessels are limited to 96 hours (4 days) on the grid. Larger vessels (over 58 gross tons) must notify the Harbormaster before using the grid. In some cases, a damage deposit must be posted and special precautions must be used, as directed by the Harbormaster. Please contact the Harbormaster prior to using the grid if there are questions about your vessel.

Fees: All vessels are \$1.25 per foot, per day. These charges are in addition to the permanent tenant quarterly moorage rates, or daily transient fees.

Loading Zones: There are several loading zones located throughout the harbors. They are easily identified by the white paint along the bullrails. Loading zones have a one-hour time limit. There are some

two-hour areas in Crescent Harbor. There is also a loading dock in Crescent Harbor that is used by commercial fishermen to load and unload gear. Some fishermen also use the covered area to mend their nets. Please contact the Harbor Office for usage. This covered area is also used at various times of the year for art shows, food booths and other activities.

Eliason Harbor Load Zone: No charge for first 24 hours. Vessels 50 feet in length and under \$.80 per foot, per day. Vessels 51 feet in length and above \$1.00 per foot, per day. These charges are in addition to the permanent tenant quarterly moorage rates, or daily transient fees.

Fish Cleaning: The cleaning of fish in any of Sitka's harbors is strictly forbidden. Please do not dispose of fish carcasses in the harbor jurisdiction due to Sea Lion issues. Fish cleaning should be done at designated fish-cleaning tables. There are

fish-cleaning tables on the south end of Eliason Harbor breakwater for the cleaning of sport-caught fish. There are also fish-cleaning tables on the float outside Sealing Cove Harbor. Fish waste bins are available at both cleaning stations. No commercially caught fish can be cleaned at any fish-cleaning table at any of the harbors. Users are requested to clean up the areas after use.

Boatsitter Log: Please provide the Harbor office with the name and phone number of your boatsitter. It is the responsibility of moorage users to inform the Harbor Department if they are going out of town for any period of time and the vessel remains here. Harbor Department staff will attempt to notify the logged boatsitter in the event of an emergency.

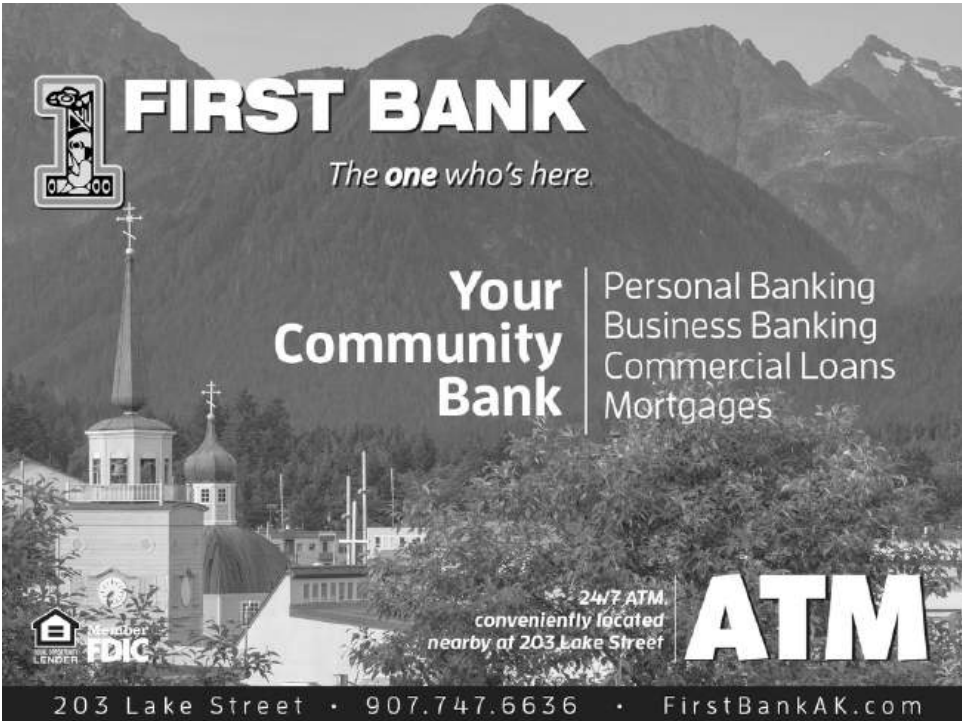
